About Using Everyday Life in the Classroom

Although the Everyday Life curriculum is targeted toward students who are working on basic life skills, it is also often used by beginner-to-intermediate ESL students. Many of the games offer students the opportunity to reinforce specific English vocabulary (like baking-or cooking-related words, for example) or to practice new elements of American life (like using an ATM or counting U.S. currency). If you're teaching an ESL class, you may find it useful to combine Everyday Life activities with elements of our Reading curriculum. If your students are native Spanish speakers, you can also pair Everyday Life activities with content from our Spanish-language sister site, GCFAprendeLibre.

The Everyday Life activities offer learners the opportunity to gain real-world skills in a low-risk environment, where they can make mistakes without fear of consequences. This enables students to get more out of their practice time and to feel more confident when they apply their skills in real situations. We've created activities for situations that we know students often encounter, but we encourage you to use your knowledge of your particular students to create low-risk practice exercises for other situations as well. How to Use this Guide

This guide explains how you and your students can use multiple activities to build basic life skills. The guide includes nine distinct **learning plans** you can follow and adapt for instruction in a classroom, with a small group, or with individuals. Each plan addresses a specific set of skills students may be interested in learning.

The plans are:

- Working with Money
- Basic Math
- Job Skills
- Basic Literacy
- Visual Literacy
- Keeping Track of Time
- Grocery Shopping
- Cooking
- Health and Safety

Each plan has three components:

- 1. **Objectives:** The goals learners have entering this course of study. The objectives can help you identify the best plan for your class.
- 2. **Outcomes:** The skills learners should have gained after successfully completing the plan.
- 3. **Learning Plan:** A group of related activities. You can find summaries and links for each activity on page 15 of this guide.



Using the Learning Plans:

To get started, choose the learning plan that best suits your students' needs. Once you've found a plan, you can customize it to make it more relevant to and appropriate for your learners. This could include:

- **Adding your own content.** To get the most out of our site, we encourage you to use it in combination with your own assignments and assessments.
- Removing redundant or unnecessary content. Not every activity will be useful for every learner. Review the activities, and assess your students' knowledge and needs. You can then omit any content that is irrelevant or unnecessary for your learners.

Tips for Choosing or Creating Activities:

Assign simple tasks to test basic knowledge. For instance, at the beginning of a course you may want to find out what kinds of maps your students are already familiar with. If you're worried that an assignment will seem too simple, you can explain that you're using it for evaluation purposes.

Break tasks down into smaller parts or steps. This will be easier for your students, and it will help you figure out what skills are needed to perform the task successfully.

Try to use scenarios and situations that are applicable to real-world tasks. You know your students a lot better than we do, so draw on that knowledge to choose and create assignments that are relevant to their lives. Students will be more engaged if they can see how a new skill will be useful to them, and they'll also be more likely to remember what they learn that way.

Draw on students' prior knowledge. Even though your students may have trouble with some skills, they're probably proficient in others. If you can connect new class material to what your students already know and can do, they will be able to process it more easily.

Try different class formats. Depending on your students' preferences, sometimes creating activities for two or three students to do together can be productive. This may be especially true if you pair slightly more skilled learners with students who are not yet as proficient.



Working with Money

Objectives

- To understand the value of coins and bills in U.S. currency
- To learn how to carry out common financial transactions
- To become familiar with the forms used for paying bills and taxes

General Outcomes

- Learners will have a better understanding of U.S. currency values.
- Learners will understand how to count bills and coins to pay or give money.
- Learners will understand how to use vending machines and ATMs.
- Learners will improve basic banking skills, including paying with a debit card and depositing money.
- Learners will be familiar with the process of paying bills and filling out tax forms.


Basic Math

Objectives

- To be able to use transportation maps and building safety plans

This activity helps learners make sense out of the numbers on a grocery receipt. They will practice finding prices for specific items and locating the order subtotal and total.

Deposit

Learners can brush up on their banking skills. This activity lets them practice endorsing a check for deposit and filling out a deposit slip. The deposit slip requires that learners identify the date, cash deposit amount, check deposit amount, subtotal, and deposit total.

This activity teaches learners how to make sense out of all of the information on a food label. They locate ingredients, serving sizes, servings per container, calories per serving, amount of nutritional content per serving, and more.

Learners practice adding ingredients to a mixer according to recipe directions. They must add ingredients in the right order, then set the timer correctly.

This activity lets learners practice finding important information. They open virtual "bills" to find account numbers, current charges, past due amounts, and more.

In this activity, learners practice paying with a debit card. They must enter a PIN, select a cash back option, and verify the total amount.

Phone Numbers

This lesson combines video tips with interactive practice. The short intro video offers tips for finding specific details in information-rich environments. The activity allows learners to practice scanning to locate specific phone numbers in order to make calls on our simulated cell phone.

This activity lets learners practice reading a subway map. They must find start and end locations, determine which subway lines run nearest to those locations, find the subway stops closest to the desired departure and arrival schedule, and identify the stop where switching will be necessary.
